Winter Wonderland and Animal Safari

In the Winter Wonderland project, your child will explore the seasonal changes that happen during winter. They will find out about the different weather associated with the winter season and explore changes that happens to water as it freezes. They will find out about what happens to plants and animals during cold weather and explore places in the world that are always cold and snowy, including the animals that live there.

In the Animal Safari project, your child will learn about incredible animals that live worldwide. They will explore various animal habitats and compare the animals that live there with animals in their locality. They will learn how to care for pets and what all animals need to grow, survive and stay happy and healthy. They will explore animal features and find out how they survive in the wild. They will compare the ways that animals are similar and different.

Supporting your child at home

- Go on a winter walk and talk about how the environment has changed since the summer months.
- Put bird food out in the garden or on a window ledge and observe the birds that visit.
- Leave water out in a shallow container overnight on a cold night and see if the water freezes.
- If it snows, build a snowman, and take a photo of it to share with the rest of the class.
- Share and discuss the Did you know? resources below.
- Go on a local safari to find out about animals that live in your garden or park.

Look at animals from around the world, discuss your favourite animals and find out some fantastic facts.

Homework

Reading with your child at least 5 times a week (please write daily in the yellow reading record book). Please return yellow books and reading books on a **Monday** for a new weekly book. We will visit the school library and bring a book home on **Tuesday**. Please return library books every **Tuesday** ready to take a new one home.

Spring term

There are four seasons. They are spring, summer, autumn and winter.



Winter is one of the seasons. In winter, the days are short and the nights are long.
